HB68 (Chapter 6 of 2017) - An Act to reorganize the Department of Public Safety

Testified in support of the proposed Office of Public Safety and Inspections within the Division of Professional Licensure, which will review licensing applications. *NOW LAW*

Summary: Governor Baker's 'Article 87' reorganization of the Department of Public Safety, weighing in at 209 sections, would split the functions of the current Department of Public Safety between the Division of Professional Licensure and the Department of Fire Services. According to the Governor, this will enable the Commonwealth to consolidate licensing functions currently split across several secretariats. Specifically, this bill establishes an Office of Public Safety and Inspections to be housed within the Division of Professional Licensure (and part of the Executive Office of Housing and Economic Development). It then transfers all of the non-fire-related functions of the Department of Public Safety to the Office of Public Safety and Inspections and the fire-related functions to the Department of Fire Services. This bill would also change the distribution of agencies under the undersecretaries within the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security to more closely align with their areas of expertise. In addition, the bill makes technical changes to reflect the transfer of functions, removes outdated references, and updates antiquated language.

MMTA submitted comments with suggested changes to the current bill text. The

comments reflect key concerns MMTA has regarding the grace period for new buyers of boats, phased-in education for older boaters, and availability of safety courses offered.

Summary: Enacts a new Chapter 21P (Comprehensive Adaptation Management Planning in Response to Climate Change) in the General Laws. The new chapter would require the adoption a Comprehensive Adaptation Management Action Plan. Upon the adoption of the plan, all certificates, licenses, permits, authorizations, grants, financial obligations, projects, plans, actions, and approvals for any proposed projects, uses, or activities in and by the Commonwealth must be consistent, to the maximum extent practicable, with the adopted plan. Among other things, the Plan must demonstrate how the commonwealth will increase alternative local renewable power sources that reduce dependence on centralized power plants; improve resiliency by protecting and restoring natural green infrastructure; incentivize development in low-risk locations away from coastal and inland flood plains and discouraging new development in high-risk locations; and improve resiliency of structures through an update of the state Building Code. In addition, the plan is to encourage and provide guidance to regional planning agencies to proactively address the unavoidable consequences of climate change and provide a process for local and regional climate vulnerability assessment and adaptation strategy development; regional grants are to be designed to reduce community risks and hazards as a result of climate change; the Commonwealth may acquire from willing sellers land abutting or adjacent to areas subject to the ebb and flow of the tide or on barrier beaches or in velocity zones of flood plain areas.

HB4318 - An Act promoting climate change adaptation, environmental and natural resource protection, and investment in recreational assets and opportunity

This environmental bond bill seeks to authorize \$2 million for workforce training grants for industries vulnerable to climate change. MMTA should seek to support this bill and seek a provision within this grant money for the marine trades industry.

Summary: This substantial bill filed by the Governor, comprising 101 sections and 73 printed pages, is essentially a codification and more of the Governor's Executive Order No. 569, issued in September 2016. The bill appropriates \$1,450,833,000 in 29 line items.

The largest items here include \$350 million for recreational facilities throughout the Department of Conservation and Recreation, including forests, parks, campgrounds, comfort stations, harbor islands, skating rinks, skate parks, swimming and wading pools, spray parks, golf courses, tennis courts, basketball courts, ball fields, playgrounds, exercise and fitness paths, tracks, historic sites, beaches, visitor centers, fire towers, maintenance facilities and pretty much anything else that DCR maintains.

Separately, there is another \$150 million DCR parkways, boulevards, multi-use trails, internal state park roads and recreational trails, pedestrian bridges and related equipment, and \$125 million for a grant programs for land, soil, water and natural resource conservation, open space preservation, watershed remediation, and so forth. Another \$80 million is appropriated for the design, construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, retrofitting, repair or removal of state-owned dams, and \$65 million for municipally-owned dams. Another \$60.3 million goes to the Clean Water Trust, \$60 million for natural resource restoration, \$60 million for implementation of the integrated state hazard mitigation and climate change adaptation plan, \$50 million for the municipal vulnerability preparedness grant program, \$50 million for the complete streets program, \$45 million for compliance with the federal and state Clean Water Acts and the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act, and a large number of smaller appropriations.

The remaining 99 outside sections make a large number of technical changes, many of them dealing with the consolidation of civil penalties relative to a large number of environmental and aquaculture laws. They also authorize bonding in amounts sufficient to raise funds for the appropriations, and extend a large number of bond-funded appropriations by five years.

Under the Clean Water Act of 1972, the United States Environmental Protection Administration administers a number of programs to ensure water quality across the United States, including through the NPDES system. Individual states have the option of applying to the EPA for authorization to administer the programs themselves, subject to oversight by the EPA, or to have the federal government administer the program. (According to the Governor, 46 other states have already opted to administer the program themselves.) Under the NPDES legislation, the EPA currently issues stormwater permits to over 250 cities and towns across the Commonwealth, and hundreds of additional permits to industrial users and municipal wastewater treatment plants. This bill would move much of that permitting process locally to the Department of Environmental Protection, which already administers other federal environmental programs in the areas of drinking water, hazardous waste, and clean air. SB1634 - An Act relative to the fairness of marine vessel reporting and fishermen exemptions

Summary: Adds a number of provisions relative to GL c.25A (Division of Energy Resources), that are designed to combat climate change in the Commonwealth. In particular, the bill establishes carbon dioxide emissions charges, which are to be \$10 per ton of CO₂e. These charges are to increase by \$5 every year until the rate is \$40 per ton of CO₂e. In the sixth year of implementation, and every two years thereafter, the Commissioner of Energy Resources, in consultation with the Commissioner of Environmental Protection, is to report to the Legislature on global warming and climate change, including consideration of whether any increases or decreases in carbon dioxide emissions charges are recommended to account for inflation, to

ensure progress towards reaching emissions limits for 2030, 2040, and 2050 included in the Climate Protection & Green Economy Act, to mitigate serious negative impacts on economic sectors, economic sub-sectors or individual employers of the Commonwealth caused by collection of carbon dioxide emissions charges. Separately, the bill establishes a Carbon Dioxide Emissions Charges Rebate Fund on the books of the Commonwealth, financed by the proposed charges. The commissioner of Energy Resources is then to return all carbon dioxide emissions charge proceeds to residents and employers in the Commonwealth in the form of rebates, in coordination with the Commissioner of Revenue and other agencies.

SB1870 - An Act to protect our environment and update our climate action plan

Summary: This ambitious bill establishes that no power generating facility in operation on and after January 1, 2017 will be allowed to utilize or gasify coal, and no utility may purchase and seek to sell electricity, in or out of state, from coal-fired power plant facilities. Further requires the Secretary of Energy and Environmental Affairs to publish a plan detailing how the Commonwealth will provide support for all communities that hosted operational coal plants as of 2010, to enable a full site transition toward something that meets the needs of the towns as laid out by their elected municipal representatives; and how the Commonwealth will provide re-training and employment placement support for all currently unemployed workers who worked in a coal-burning power plant. Separately, the bill enacts a ban on hydraulic fracturing in the Commonwealth; require the identification of all the fossil fuel companies in which the Massachusetts Pension Reserves Investment Trust owns holdings, with a requirement to divest all publicly-traded holdings of each company identified within 5 years; requires the establishment of an economy-wide price on carbon; requires that the Department of Environmental Protection identify all Massachusetts public, private and agricultural enterprises providing methane emissions, and requires the promulgation of DEP regulations to encourage and provide incentives for increased use of anaerobic digesters; requires the Commonwealth as a whole to establish a goal of generating 20% of our total electricity use from solar energy by 2025; requires the promulgation of DER regulations to provide incentives to encourage increased use of smart meters; requires updating and strengthening the Stretch Energy Code; and requires the promulgation of regulations to develop and implement a clean fuel standard.

The House Budget:

HB2 - An Act making appropriations for fiscal year 2019

This is the Governor's proposed budget for 2019, which was filed with the House Committee on Ways & Means. Workforce development is an express priority in the budget. \$3 million has been appropriated for a workforce development grant, \$1 million for a "manufacturing

college” for post-secondary voc tech education, \$25,500,000 for a workforce training trust fund, \$5 million for a workforce competitiveness trust fund, almost \$4 million to a school-to-career initiative for students, and \$4.25 million for STEM programs.

Sponsor: Governor

Summary: The Governor's FY 2019 House 2 budget submission appropriates \$44,365,312,884 in 1122 line-items -- \$40.9 billion if you don't count chargebacks and federal grants -- which represents an increase of 2.6% over FY 2018 projected spending, according to the Governor. The Governor's recommendations anticipate a \$96 million deposit into the Stabilization Fund, which would bring total reserves to \$1.463 billion.

House 2 also increases unrestricted local aid by 3.5%, equal to 100% of the consensus revenue tax growth estimate percentage, providing municipalities with \$1.099 billion in unrestricted general government aid.

Local education aid increases by \$118.6 million, including \$15 million for school districts that have seen significant enrollment of students from Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. The Governor budgets \$24.3 million towards addressing the rising costs of healthcare for retirees, which was a major recommendation of the Foundation Budget Review Commission.

To address college unaffordability, the Governor proposes \$7.1 million to double the MassGrant program for community college students, which will cover all unmet need for students to cover tuition and fees at the Commonwealth's 15 community colleges. House 2 includes \$3 million in new funding for Early College programs, which will focus on partnerships between high schools and higher education institutions, and encourage students to enter STEM fields. House 2 also includes \$93.2 million in new funding at the Department of Mental Health, including \$84 million for strengthened community-based services for adults.
